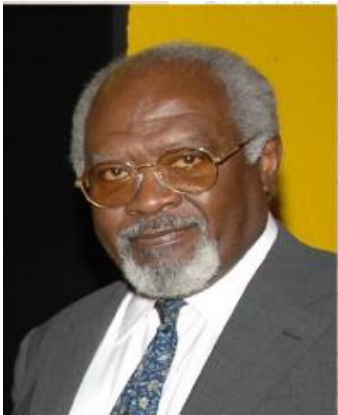

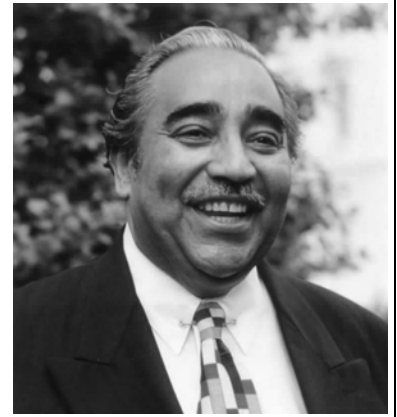

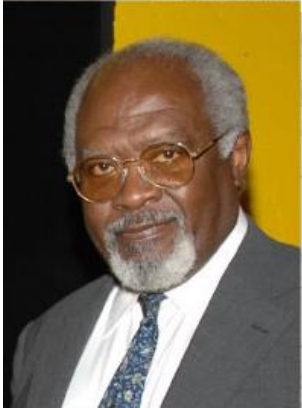
Mr. Battle is the Eighth President-General since the founding of The Universal Negro Improvement Association & African Communities League.

He was duly elected August 26, 2004 at the 46Th International Convention, hosted by Woodson – Banneker – Jackson Bey Division #330 of Washington, D.C., Universal Negro Improvement Association & African Communities League

Mr. Battle is a co-author of The Journey of the Songhai People, with Dr. Calvin Robinson and Dr. Edward Robinson, which led to a community program, which sponsors Black youth on an African Historical field trip.

Mr. Battle is a pillar in the Philadelphia PA activist community and is known for stellar guidance and mentorship of community activist.

Dr. Julius W. Garvey – Biography



Dr. Garvey was a founding member, and is currently Chairman of the Marcus Garvey Committee International, Inc., an organization that serves to improve the economic, cultural, educational, and spiritual condition of Africans all over the world.

In addition, he serves on the Boards of various other organizations such as, The Board for the Education of People of African Ancestry, The Zumbi Foundation, and the Brotherhood.

Over the years, he has worked in conjunction with the various Ministries, the Department of Corrections, and the University of the West Indies, on issues concerning the education of the Jamaican youth, the building of schools, the transfer of books and medical supplies, and a medical student exchange program.

He lectures on African History and culture and on the legacy of Marcus Garvey, in the United States, Canada, and the Caribbean. His audience includes Junior High, High School, and college students, as well as, social communities, religious, political and national organizations.

He continues to combine a busy surgical practice with community service.

The Honorable Congressman Charles B. Rangel – Biography



Congressman Charles B. Rangel is serving his eighteenth term as the Representative from the 15th Congressional District, comprising East and Central Harlem, the Upper West Side, and Washington Heights/Inwood. Congressman Rangel is the Ranking Member of the Committee on Ways and Means, Chairman of the Board of the Democratic Congressional Campaign Committee and Dean of the New York State Congressional Delegation.

Congressman Rangel is the principal author of the five billion dollar Federal Empowerment Zone demonstration project to revitalize urban neighborhoods throughout America. He is also the author of the Low Income Housing Tax Credit, which is responsible for financing ninety percent of the affordable housing built in the U.S. in the last ten years. The Work Opportunity Tax Credit, which Congressman Rangel also championed, has provided thousands of jobs for underprivileged young people, veterans, and ex-offenders.

As the former chairman of the Select Committee on Narcotics Abuse and Control, Congressman Rangel continues to lead the nation's fight against drug abuse and trafficking. In his efforts to reduce the flow of drugs into the United States and to solve the nation's continuing drug abuse crisis, Congressman Rangel serves as chairman of the Congressional Narcotics Abuse and Control Caucus.

Congressman Rangel is a founding member and former chairman of the Congressional Black Caucus; he was also chairman of the New York State Council of Black Elected Democrats and was a member of the House Judiciary Committee during the hearings on the articles of impeachment of President Richard Nixon.

Congressman Rangel served in the U.S. Army from 1948-52, during which time he fought in Korea and was awarded the Purple Heart and Bronze Star. Congressman Rangel has authored several pieces of legislation to benefit minority and women veterans, including a successful bill that established the Office of Minority Affairs Within the Department of Veterans Affairs.

In 1987, at the height of the battle against apartheid, Congressman Rangel led the effort to include in the Internal revenue Code one of the most effective anti-apartheid measures, denial of tax credits for taxes paid to South Africa. This measure resulted in several Fortune 500 companies leaving South Africa. In addition, Congressman Rangel played a vital role in restoring the democratic government in Haiti.

Congressman Rangel is a graduate of New York University and St. John's University School of Law. He has spent his entire career in public service, first as an Assistant U.S. attorney for the Southern District of New York, and later in the New York State Assembly. He was elected to the 92nd Congress on November 3, 1970, and has been re-elected to each succeeding congress.

Congressman Rangel lives in Harlem with his wife Alma, who is a founding member of the Congressional Black Caucus Spouses and participates in many civic and community organizations. Congressman and Mrs. Rangel have two children.

Dr. Christopher A. Brooks, Ph.D. - Biography

Dr. Christopher A. Brooks is a professor of African American studies and anthropology in the School of World Studies at Virginia Commonwealth University. He holds a doctorate in anthropology/ethnomusicology from the University of Texas at Austin. Brooks has numerous publications focusing on the African continental and diasporan experience. He has been a contributing writer to the African and African-American Religions and Religion and War volumes in the Religion and Society Series published by Routledge (2001 and 2003 respectively). He has a chapter celebrating the centennial of W.E.B. Dubois' landmark publication, "The Souls of Black Folk 100 Years Later," entitled "The Souls of Black Folk: Can a Double-Consciousness Be Heard?" by the University of Missouri Press (2003). As a biographer, he collaborated with celebrated opera singer Shirley Verrett on her autobiography, "I Never Walked Alone: The Autobiography of an American Singer," published by John Wiley and Sons (2003). Brooks has produced several book length manuscripts, articles and numerous biographical entries in various publications including Black Sacred Music, American Anthropologist, The International Review of African American Art, The Literary Griot, The International Journal of Black Oral and Literary Studies, and African American Review.

As a 1999-2000 Senior Fulbright Researcher, Brooks examined women's rights organizations in Zimbabwe and South Africa. He was an affiliate fellow at the Soughter African Research Institute for Policy Studies in Harare, Zimbabwe (now called SAPES Trust). While there, he also lectured part time at Arrupe Jesuit College. This work led to his studying the contraction and spread of the HIV/AIDS virus in that part of the African continent. In 2001, he was instrumental in establishing a linkage between his home institution and the University of Swaziland to further this investigation.
